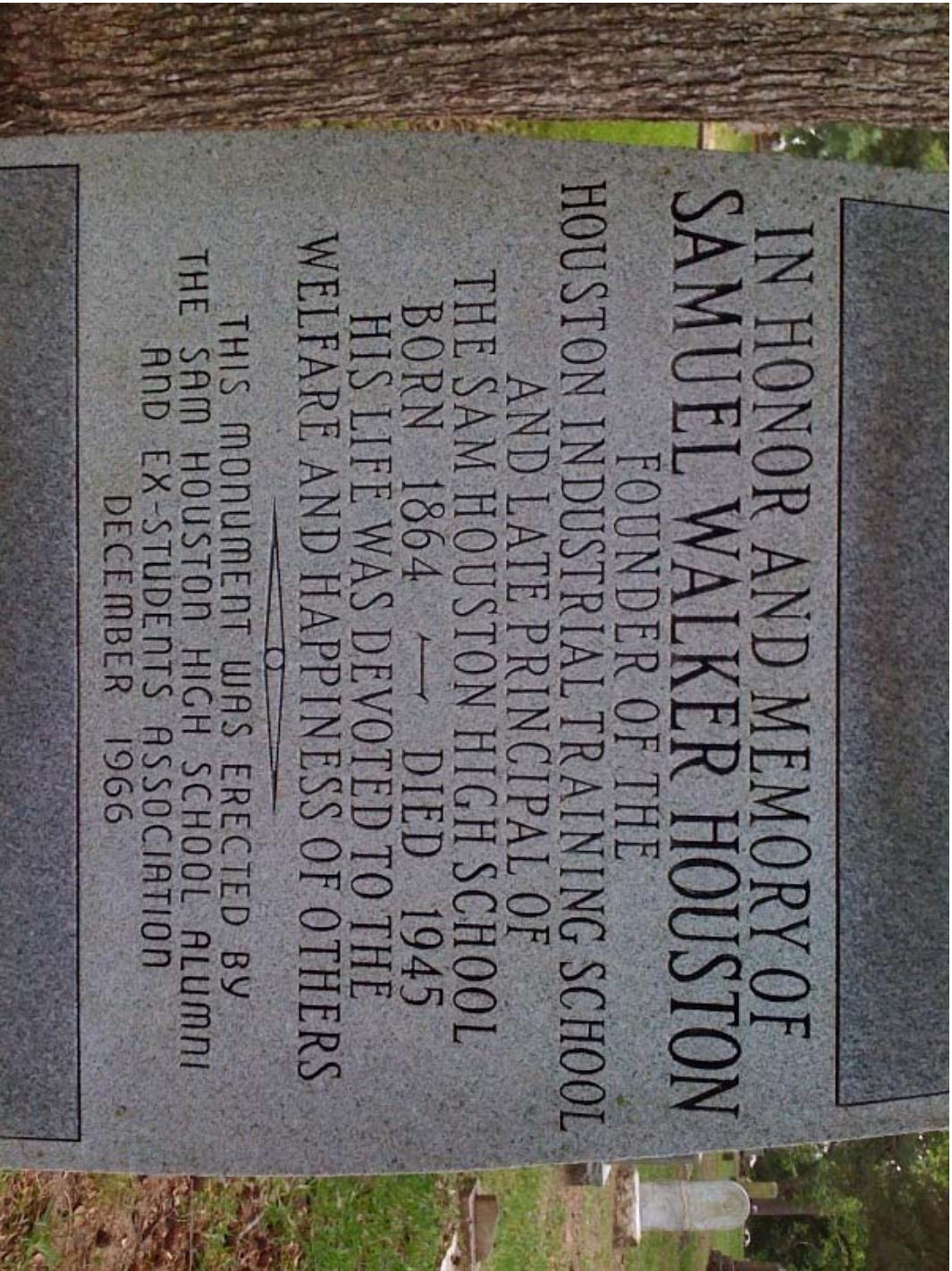

AFFIDAVIT

THE STATE OF TEXAS {  
COUNTY OF WALKER { BEFORE ME, the undersigned authority, on this day personally appeared Sam W. Houston, known to me to be a credible citizen of Walker County, Texas, who being by me duly sworn deposed and said, as follows:

That affiant was born in Walker County, Texas, on the 22nd day of February, 1874 at the old Joshua Houston home place in the City of Huntsville, Texas. Affiant is a son of Joshua Houston and Sylvester Baker Houston.

Joshua was the personal body servant of General Sam Houston and was twice married; first, to Mary Green and second, to Sylvester Baker. Joshua Houston and Mary Green were married, or at least termed themselves husband and wife, sometimes prior to 1856 and they had born to them the following children, to-wit:

I. Ellen Houston, who was born in 1856 and who died about 1925. Ellen first married Sam Dillard and after Sam's death, married Ed Spears.

II. Virginia Houston, who was born about 1858, having died in her early teens without ever having married and without leaving any issue surviving her.

III. Joshua Houston, Jr., who was born in the year 1860 or 1861 and who died in 1920. The said Mary Green Houston died shortly after the birth of Joshua Houston, Jr., and several years prior to January 15, 1866.

Within two or three years after the death of the said Mary Green Houston, Joshua Houston married Sylvester Baker; the marriage taking place during the latter part of the Civil War, and probably in the year 1864 or 1865. There were born to this union the following children, to wit:

I. Tommie Houston, who was born in the year 1866 or 1867, and who died about the year 1890, without ever having been married and without leaving any issue surviving him.

II. George Houston, who was born in the year 1868 or 1869, and who died in infancy when about one (1) or one and half ( $1\frac{1}{2}$ ) years of age.

III. Sam W. Houston, the affiant, who was born on the 22nd day of February, 1874, and who now lives in Huntsville in Walker County, Texas.

IV. Minnie O. Houston, who was born in the year 1877 and who is now the wife of Ben Dillard and lives at Houston, Harris County, Texas.

Sylvester Baker Houston died about 1890 or 1891, she and Joshua Houston were married during the latter part of slavery time and prior to January 15, 1866, they continued to live together as man and wife from the time of their marriage until the death of the said Sylvester Baker as aforesaid, and were living together as man and wife on the 15th day of August, 1870 and at all times there after until the death of the said Sylvester Baker Houston, as aforesaid.

On January 15, 1866, Joshua Houston and Hiram Bowen purchased lots numbered 548 and 549 and an unnumbered lot lying immediately west of lot 549 in Block 66 in the City of Huntsville in Walker County, Texas, from M. C. Rogers by deed bearing said last named date and duly of record in Volume F, page 604 of the Walker County Deed Records, said property was purchased during the existence of the marriage relations of Joshua Houston and Sylvester Baker Houston with funds acquired during the existence of such marriage relationship and was the community property and homestead of the said Joshua Houston and Sylvester Baker Houston.

Upon the death of the said Sylvester Baker Houston, she left surviving her as her only heirs at law her two then living children, the affiant, Sam W. Houston and Minnie Houston Dillard. Sylvester Baker Houston died intestate and no administration was ever had upon her estate.

At the time of the death of the said Joshua Houston on the \_\_\_\_ day of February, 1902, he left a written will dated February 15, 1900 and the will was duly admitted to probate and record and is now of record in Volume O, page 49, in the probate minutes of Walker County, Texas. The said estate of the Joshua Houston, deceased, being numbered 1072 on the probate docket of Walker County, Texas. Under and by virtue of the terms of the will of the said Joshua Houston, his entire interest in the old Houston home place in Block 66 in the City of Huntsville, was willed and bequeathed to Minnie O. Houston, who was therein described as Mineola Houston and said last named parties are the one and the same person.

On July 30, 1903, the title to the old Houston home place and particularly lot 548 in Block 66 of the City of Huntsville, Walker County, Texas, was owned and claimed three-fourth thereof by Minnie Houston, now Minnie Houston Dillard and one-fourth by the affiant, Sam W. Houston.

## WALKING TOUR

Prior to Texas winning independence from Mexico, Huntsville was founded in 1835 by Pleasant Gray. Twelve years later he deeded this land to Huntsville for "a place of burial, free to all persons."

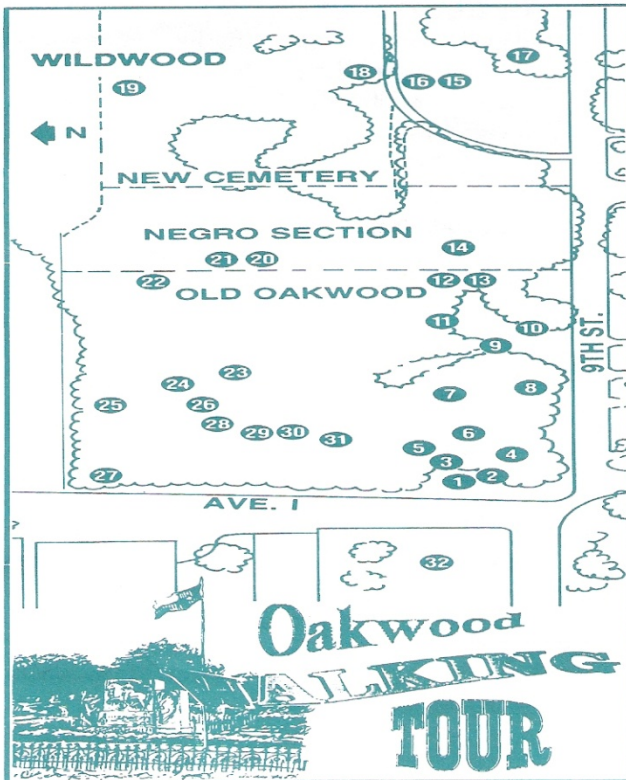
This cemetery however, was in use before Gray's deed and has a stone with the date 1842. Earlier graves were either unmarked or the markers have long since disappeared.

Oliver H. Gray, one of Pleasant Gray's sons, died March 4, 1853 at the age of 18, and is buried in an unmarked grave in Oakwood Cemetery.

The Oakwood Cemetery is the final resting place for many people of historical prominence, also in Oakwood are buried 123 confederate soldiers and possibly more. This step-by-step walking tour will assist you as you explore our fine heritage. (See Historical Marker)

The Oakwood Cemetery is located a short distance from Huntsville's downtown square. Travel east on 11th Street and turn left on Spur 94, "Sam Houston Memorial Drive," which is Texas' shortest highway.

### 21. SAMUEL WALKER HOUSTON (1864 - 1945)

Born a year after Sam Houston's death, he was named after the great general by his father Joshua Houston, the trusted servant of the Houston family. Joshua did as Mrs. Houston suggested and educated Samuel Houston at the finest schools. He was a contemporary of Booker T. Washington and studied at Howard University and Atlanta University.

After working at the State Department in Washington, D.C., he returned here and served as publisher of The Huntsville Times newspaper. He is best known for establishing the Houston Institute which was ranked as the best rural high school in the south. He later became principal of Huntsville's first Negro high school.

The Samuel Walker Houston Cultural Center opened in Huntsville in 1991. Located at 1604 10th Street, it serves as a black history museum.

### 22. CAPTAIN JAMES T. HUNTER (1835 - 1921)

The family first settled in Walker County in 1837 after moving from Kentucky. His father had served in the War of 1812 and was the co-founder of the Trinity river community, Cincinnati. His mother was the first native to die of the yellow fever epidemic of 1853 which crippled the community, from which it never recovered and is now a ghost town.

At the outbreak of Civil War, the governor appointed James Hunter to form a company of local men to fight. Captain Hunter led over one hundred men from Texas and joined Hood's Brigade in Richmond, Virginia. He was wounded several times before surrendering with General Robert E. Lee at Appomattox.

He returned to Huntsville after the war and owned many successful businesses.

### 23. REV. SAMUEL. McKINNEY (1807 - 1879)

Born in Hawkins County, Tennessee, his family had come to America for religious and political freedom.

As a devout Scotch-Irish Presbyterian, he received his Doctoral Divinity Degree in 1832 and went west as a missionary to the Indians.

He came to Texas to become the first President of Austin College where he served from 1850-53 and again from 1862-71 during very trying times.

### 24. REV. THOMAS HENRY BALL (1819 - 1858)

His family were early settlers in Virginia and he, like his father before him, was an ordained Methodist minister. As one of Texas's earliest Christian educators, he joined the faculty of the newly established Andrew Female College and became its second President in 1855. (Andrew Female College was located a short distance west of this site.)

He died of typhoid fever in 1858, just prior to the birth of his son, Tom Ball II, who served as mayor of Huntsville in 1888 and was a congressman. The town of Tomball, Texas was named in his son's honor. (See Historical Marker)

### 25. CAPTAIN JAMES GILLASPIE (1805 - 1867)

In 1835, Captain James Gillaspie organized forty Tennessee volunteers and came to fight in the Texas Revolution. For over thirty years this brave soldier, at the head of four different companies, fought for Texas under three separate flags (Republic of Texas, United States and Confederate States).

A memorial marker is located just outside the Oakwood Cemetery entrance in honor of his military efforts.

He served as superintendent of the Texas penitentiary, and during his tenure from 1850-58 and again from 1866-67, he helped establish Huntsville as the permanent home of the Texas prison system.

### 26. DR. PLEASANT W. KITTRELL (1805 - 1867)

Dr. Kittrell moved his family, along with the Goree family, here in the late 1840's from Alabama. He previously served in North Carolina and Alabama legislatures and was elected to the Texas legislature in 1855 and 1857. Dr. Kittrell was one of the main forces behind the establishment of the University of Texas.

granting full college powers and changing the name of the institution to "Atlanta Baptist College." In 1906 President Sale resigned to become Superintendent of Education of the American Baptist Home Mission Society, and he was succeeded by President John Hope, who had been a professor on the faculty since 1898. By a vote in 1912 of the Board of Trustees, concurred in by the American Baptist Home Mission Society, and by a change in 1913 of the charter granted by the State of Georgia, the name of the institution became "Morehouse College," in honor of Rev. Henry L. Morehouse, D.D., Corresponding Secretary of the American Baptist Home Mission Society. In 1918 the College became affiliated with the general organization of the Students Army Training Corps.

During the World War he entered the Officers' Training School at Des Moines, Iowa, 1917, was commissioned Second Lieutenant of infantry and assigned to the 83rd Division at Camp Sherman, Ohio, saw service overseas (in France) with the 367th Infantry, wounded at the front, returned to United States in March, 1919, and honorably discharged, April, 1919.

He was instrumental in securing the charter and served as Adjutant of Charles Bloce Post, No. 157, American Legion.

He served as Assistant Secretary of Personnel for the Centenary of the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1919.

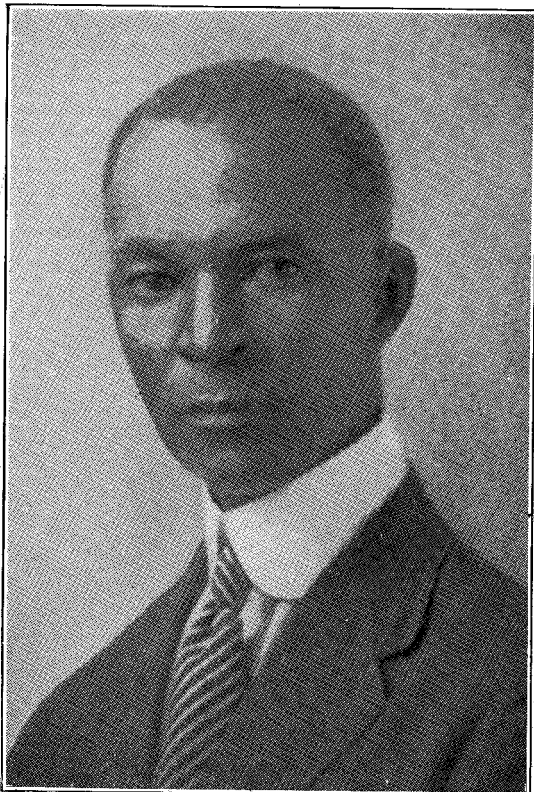
Mr. Houston correlated academic and industrial work at Tuskegee Institute, where he was head of the department of English for three years.

He introduced the leaflet method of teaching English in Baltimore and the touch method of typing and speed tests when he was head of the department of Business Practice, in Washington, D. C.

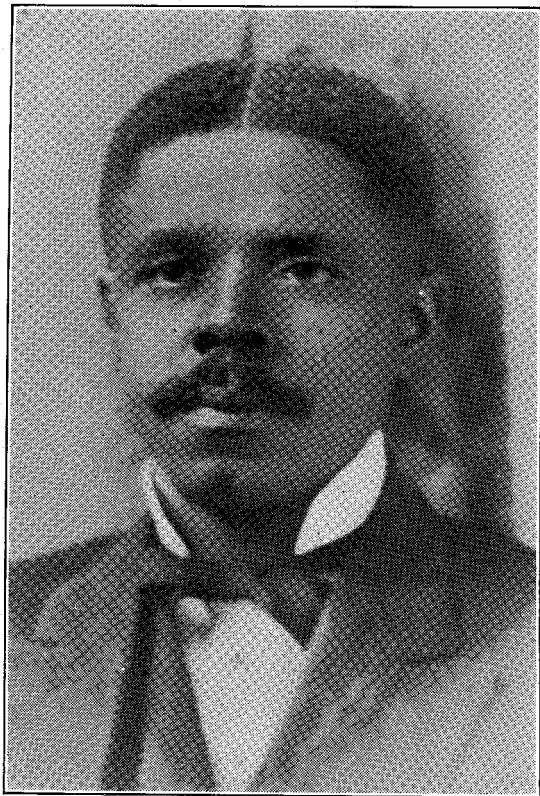

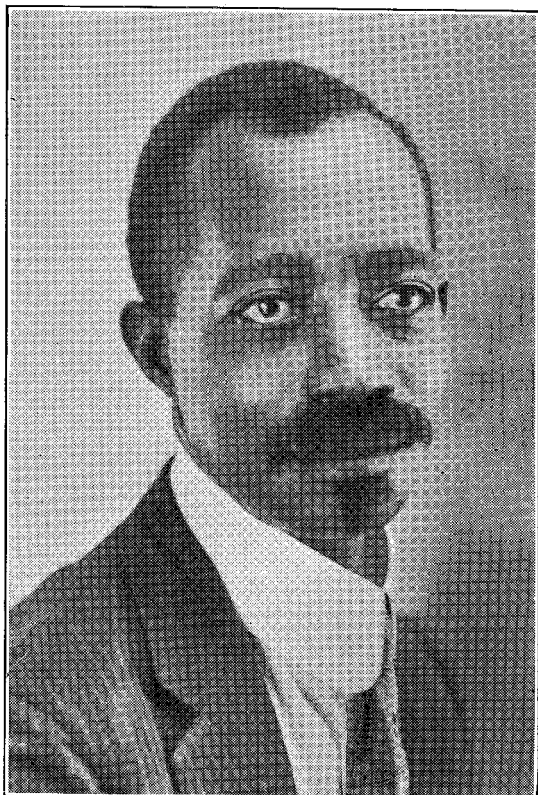

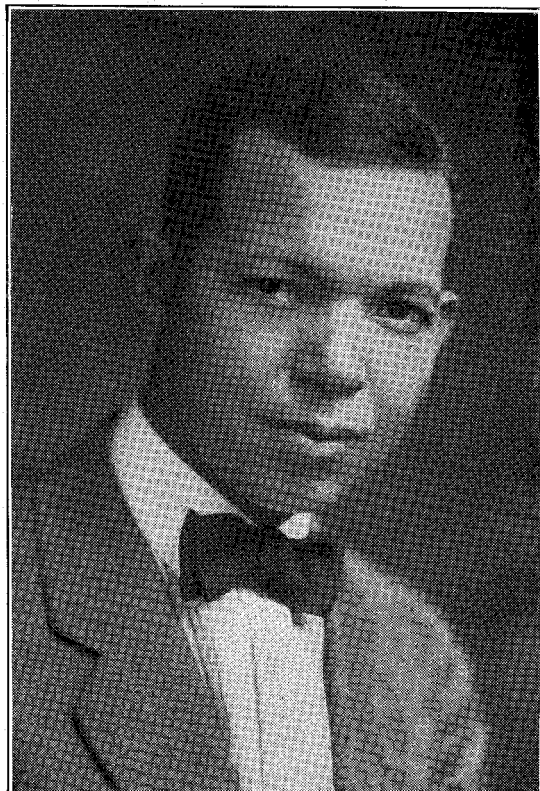
